

Ann

- "A female in her 20s/30s, Jamie's wife, high strung"
- Works in the same company as Dani
- Perfectionist
- Self conscious





Jamie/Stork

- "A male in his 30s/40s, Ann's husband, affable"
- Good heart
- Not of this space
- Secretly started in the Underground Village
 - is now working in Reproductive Technologies
- Stork A literal stork, tasked with convincing Renee to terminate her pregnancy





Renee

- "A female in her 30s/40s, Dani's wife, nurturer"
- Dependent
- Loving
- Recently became pregnant after 8 years of attempts





Dani

- "A female in her 40s, Renee's wife, senior executive determination"
- Driven
- Strong
- A staunch supporter of the Pre-Certification Law








Plot Rundown

- Scene 1 Renee worries about the Pre-Certification. Dani calms her
- Scene 2 Renee tells Dani that their child failed the Pre-Certification
- Scene 3 Dani and Renee lie about their results to Ann and Jamie
- Scene 4 The Stork tries to convince Renee to terminate the pregnancy
- Scene 5 Dani and Renee argue. Renee expresses doubts about ethics of the Pre-Certification Law
- Scene 6 Ann expresses suspicion about Dani and Renee's results. Jamie expresses to Ann his misgivings regarding the Pre-Certification law
- Scene 7 Dani and Renee argue about the Pre-Certification law
- Scene 8 Ann attempts to reassure herself
- Scene 9 The Stork reveals himself to Renee as Jamie
- Scene 10 Dani threatens Ann to keep quiet
- Scene 11 Jamie explains his backstory to Renee and reassures her
- Scene 12 Renee and Dani fight again. Renee expresses that she's "exhausted" from trying to start a family. Dani says that Renee is not enough
- Scene 13 Jamie almost tells Ann about his past
- Scene 14 Dani confesses to Renee about killing the doctor. Renee comforts her
- Scene 15 Renee decides to keep the baby, naming her Diana






Concept

- "Something greater than, that we can't control, that's the gift of the universe, uncontrollable and unnameable and essential. We have no great artists. Not compared to the past generations." (46).
